


Who is the AAC?

Accredited Certifiers support the development of housing and other building projects in NSW.

An Accredited Certifier:

- can only be appointed by the owner of the property
- must be paid upfront so they can't be pressured to issue approvals or certificates prematurely
- assesses the plans and specifications and if correct, issues the Construction Certificate where necessary


An Accredited Certifier does not:

- have input in the Development Consent issued by the Council
- attend the site at all times
- supervise the building work for or on behalf of the owner or builder
- certify structural engineering elements of construction

EASE OF ACCESS TO TECHNICAL DOCUMENTATION UP-TO-DATE PRODUCT TESTING

Code of Conduct

• Making decisions and taking actions

- An accredited certifier shall take all **reasonable steps** to obtain all relevant facts when making decisions and carrying out certification and other statutory functions.
- An accredited certifier shall ensure that his or her decisions and actions are reasonable, fair and appropriate to the circumstances, based on consideration of all the relevant facts he or she has obtained, and supported by **adequate documentation**.

Accredited Certifiers need ...

- Easily available and up-to-date Test Reports
 - Relevant to the products, for example: slip resistance, combustibility. Codemark, despite its issues, can still be relied upon under the BCA for some products)
- Certifications from installers referencing the plans that have been relied on
 - (i.e. structural engineers/hydraulic engineer/electrical engineer design plans and certificate prepared by [name], with proper references and dates)
- Installation instructions

Accredited Certifiers need ...

- Making technical documentation easily publicly available (fire test reports, code mark certificates, fire engineering, verification reports etc.)
 - Often manufacturers do not want to release these to Certifiers for proprietary reasons
- Testing information that is updated periodically
 - i.e. when the BCA changes to ensure compliance is maintained
- Cleary concise statements confirming the scope of certification
 - For example: Pursuant to the provisions of A5.2 of the Building Code of Australia 2019 volumes 1 & 2, I, the undersigned, hereby certify that etc
